

Fringed Brome

(*bromus ciliatus*)



Native Prairie Grass

Fringed Bromegrass is a coarse, loosely tufted perennial that grows between .5-1.0m tall.

Growth Habit

Fringed brome is a non-rhizomatous erect bunchgrass that reproduces through seeds only. It has long, green-yellow-green blades with a prominent, whitish midvein extending part way down the sheath. **Fringed brome** will grow in the northern and western regions where other good varieties do not survive

Adaptation

Found in all eco-regions in areas with better moisture. Grows in open woods, fescue grasslands and moist meadows. Can be found as far North as the Alaska interior. Will survive in the north and western regions where other good quality species might not. Fringed brome is tolerant of moderately acidic soils.

Reclamation Uses

Excellent fore roadside ditches, burrow pits and where the landscape is hummocky and rolling
